Rage, sharing & support

Women's Day Considered

This March 8th is International Women's Day. Living in America, born in Puerto Rico and conditioned in Harlem, I don't know in my soul what International Women's Day means.

In America, we are Third World women or Jewish women or White women. Every day I have to think about my race. What do we call ourselves? Colored Girls. Niggers. Spics. Chinks. Injuns. Black. Latina. Raza. Indian. Asian. Jewish. Other. I don't know what white women call themselves.

What are our names? How do we share with each other?

I remember my first International Women's Day "celebration." I went to Golden Gate Park madly in love with an Irishwoman. I lay in the sun, drank beer and bought presents. No one asked me what the day meant to me.

But this year I'm trying to understand. I think it has to do with knowing our names, with finding a way of sharing our stories and the stories of our mothers. And with finding a way of raging against the violence we are forced to live with. It means finding ways of understanding how all women in the world suffer the violence of rich white men.

And then I think: Black women suffer another kind of violence, and Latina women another and white middle class women ain't the same as poor white trash and Jewish middle class is not the same as Jewish working class. And I get sick of it all. I go back to not knowing in my soul what International Women's Day means — for that matter, not knowing what the "Women's Movement" means.

"Revolution" is an old, big word. "Political" women use it to mean the overthrow of a government or social system. But it also means a complete cycle of events, a complete and drastic change of any kind.

We women need a revolution. We need to find ways of changing ourselves, ways of not hating ourselves and each other, because all we can do with with our hate is to turn it inside our gut and kill ourselves. There's enough people wanting us dead, illiterate, drunk, crazy, useless. We don't need to be hating ourselves. But we do. We learn to hate ourselves. We even learn to hate our mothers.

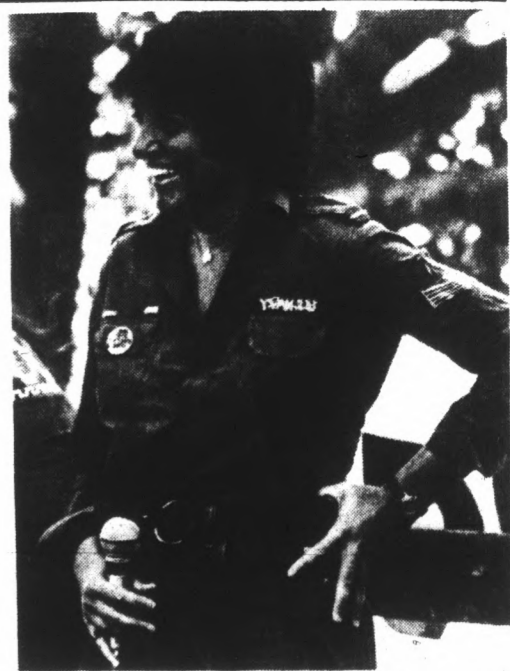
When my mother came to San Francisco it was the first time in all the life I can remember that I had more than a day alone with her. We talked, cried and screamed for most of those weeks over her anger and disappointment in me for not using the degrees I'd earned — degrees she believed would bring her comfort and pride, after her 28 years of welfare and sleeping with men she didn't love — men who drank themselves sense-

less and beat her with their hands, fists or belts. We also shared my rage, my hatred for her and for the hundreds of times I translated lies to social workers, for the beatings she would take and watch me take.

We never once talked about our rage or hatred for the men who beat us, for the men who "paid" her \$45 a week for 50 hours of work. Very many women don't.

Some lesbians share their anger and rage and pain with other lesbians. Latinas talk to Latinas. Radical women think moderate women are colluding with the enemy; moderate women are colluding with the enemy; moderate

Self defense for lesbians and gay men

Anti-gay and anti-woman violence threatens our lives and our future, but there are groups doing something about it.

Defend Ourselves, a lesbian self-defense team, is offering a street-fighting class for lesbians only beginning in April. Registration starts immediately. The class runs eight weeks, meeting once a week, combining discussion time with physical work-outs. This class will be held in the East Bay and is on a sliding scale basis, although no one will be turned away for lack of funds. The group also conducts other classes for women of all ages and is available for demonstrations and workshops. For further information, call 653-2362.

Community United Against Violence (CUAV) is a San Francisco-based group acting within the gay community to help reduce anti-gay violence. 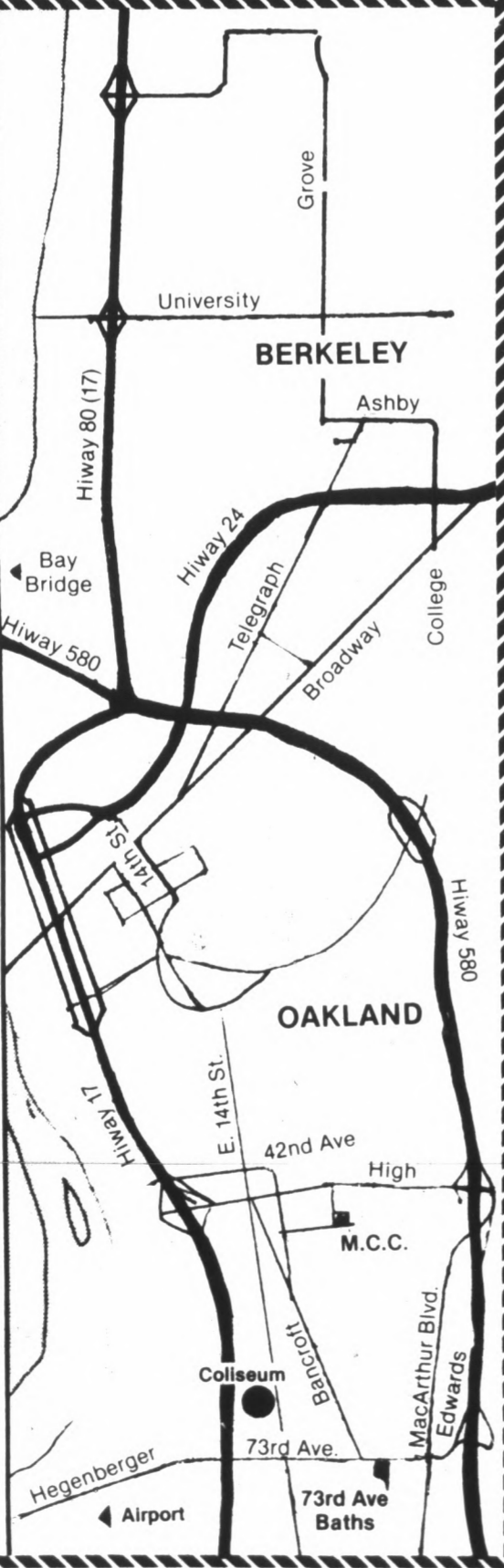

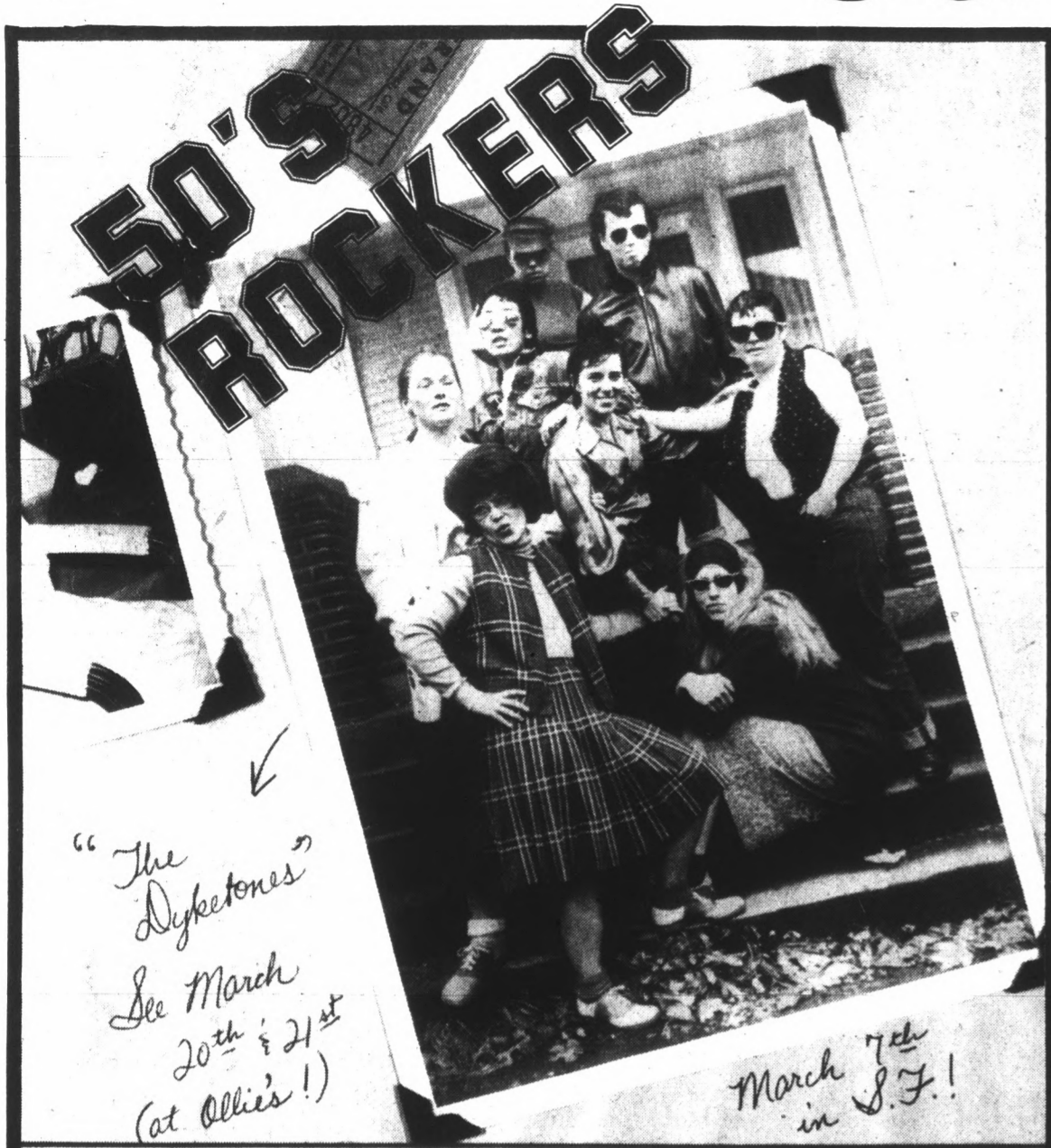

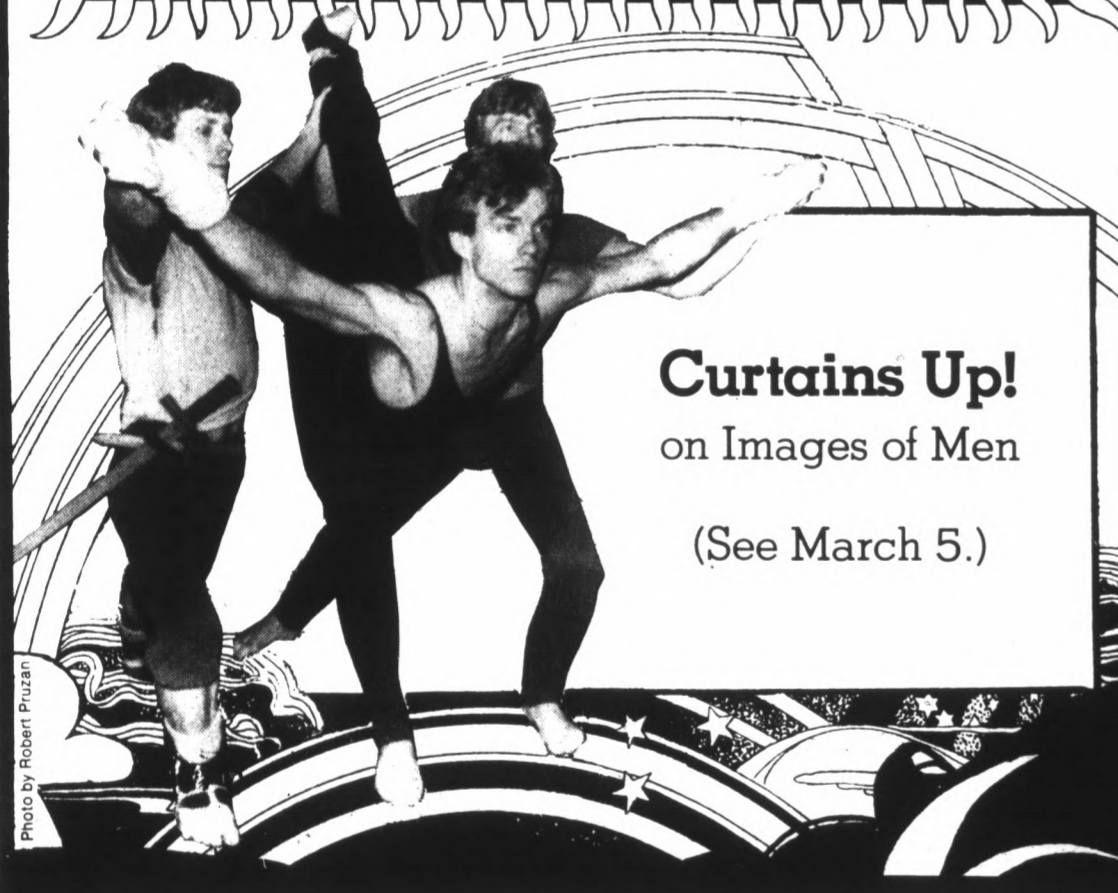

Genet's 'The Maids' Opens at the Goodman

Theatre Rhinoceros revives a European mini-classic this month, with its March 14 opening of Jean Genet's *The Maids*. Genet's sinister burlesque examines the dynamics of role-playing and power through the actions of two maids who take turns playing the role of "Madame," in a ritual game-playing that has become an integral part of their lives.

"It's a fantasy," says director J. Kevin Hanlon, "... an ugly fantasy." But Hanlon also views the piece as darkly funny: "It's about the insanities of life."

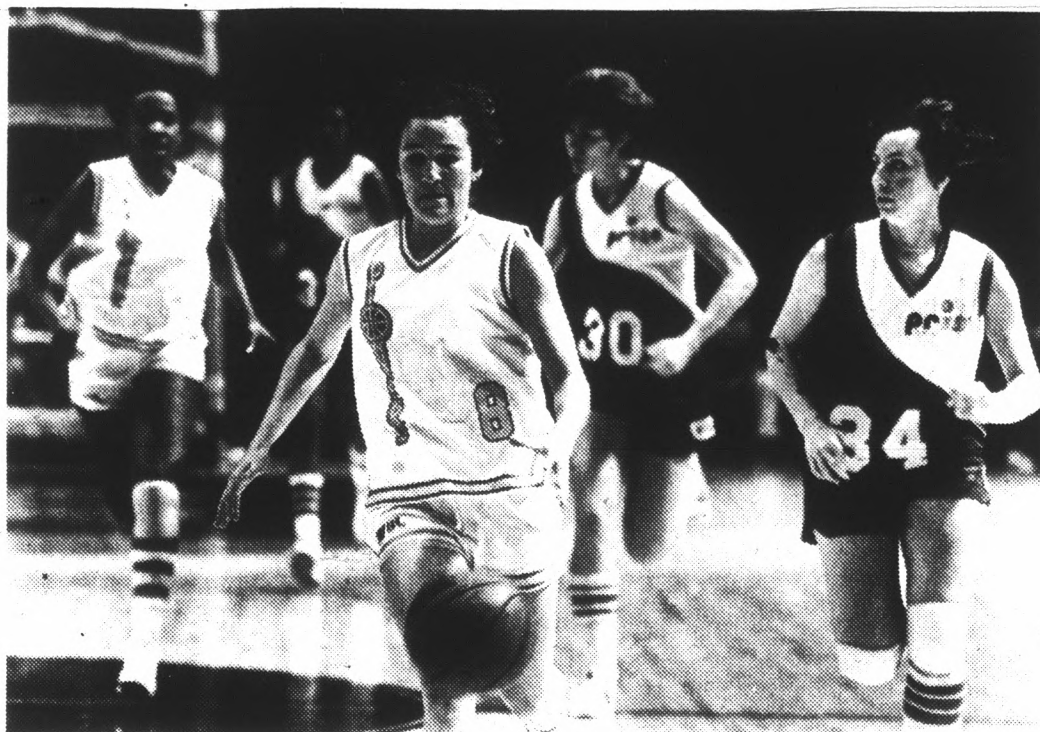
Originally produced in Paris in 1947, *The Maids* was written to be played by three young boys in women's clothing; but its premiere saw three women in the roles. In the years following, the production has seen

various configurations of sexes in the parts. The Rhino production features two men playing the principle characters — Martin Xero and Pristine Condition. Kate Flatland plays the part of Madame.

Hanlon believes the social observations in the play benefit from an absence of didacticism, which he feels has attached itself to much gay writing since the onset of the modern liberation movement.

The Maids opens Saturday, March 14, at the Goodman Building Theater, 1115 Geary Street, San Francisco, with curtain at 11pm. Tickets are \$5. The play continues with Sunday performances at 3pm and Saturday shows at 11pm, through March 29.

ate women think radical women are assholes; white women shit all over colored girls, chew them up and spit them out; colored girls hate white women.

We have learned to oppress. We have also, in our separateness, learned to be strong in our individual selves. We've gained some understanding of how we take our rage and anger into ourselves and take it out on each other.

We haven't learned it enough. In my life, I've known more of how we don't trust each other than of how we do.

My mother and I have talked a lot more since that visit. I've come to know and understand the pain and humiliation, hunger and frustration of her life. I have grown to love and respect her for the passion, grace and courage with which she's lived her life. And she tells me I am honest and strong, that she

is proud of my commitment to speaking my truth. That she loves me.

My mother and I have had a revolution. If International Women's Day is to mean anything, it ought to be a time to collectively commit ourselves to move towards unity. It should be a statement of our commitments to revolution — to a complete and drastic change in a society that institutionalizes women as the property of men.

On International Women's Day we need to remember the names and stories of our mothers who died in German concentration camps, in the Black Hills of Dakota, in the sweatshops of New York, and who today are being raped and murdered in El Salvador, in Marin and in San Francisco.

We must recognize that unless we — lesbians and heterosexual women, housewives, secretaries, bus-drivers and childcare workers — commit ourselves to supporting each other, our struggles, our agencies and dreams, there won't be a Women's Movement or a Women's Anything.

My Mother and I have had a small revolution in our lives. For her sake and mine and my sisters', I will be listening closely this year for women who offer me unity, women who recognize and validate this common bond of oppression shared by all women.

I hope I will hear and see my reflection in other women of color. I hope I will be marching with thousands of women. I hope we will be sisters and family. And then maybe I can begin to have in my soul a real understanding of what International Women's Day means. I am hopeful.
