The 1981 edition of the People's Yellow Pages has recently been published. This 200 page book is a directory of the resources available in the six Bay Area Counties. It includes listings for free and inexpensive health and dental clinics, legal services, child care centers, services for the disabled, cultural and educational activities, food and clothing, senior citizen lunch programs, animal spay clinics, job counseling and training, and much more. Each listing includes the name, address, and phone number of the group providing the service, as well as a description of the program offered, the hours, the fees, the closest bus lines, and the eligibilty requirements, if any. Listings of services for the blind and visually impaired and for seniors are in large type. All the listings are placed in alphabetically-arranged categories that range from 'alcoholism treatment programs' to 'zen'. The information is interspersed with drawings contributed by Bay Area artists.

This new edition of the People's Yellow Pages marks the tenth year of publication for this non-profit directory. The book is sold in most bookstores and is available in the reference section of most libraries.
