COME CELEBRATE OUR FIRST 100 YEARS!

The now century-old Bayview Opera House, constructed in 1888, was the first opera house built for the city of San Francisco, and the only theater to survive the 1906 earthquake and fire.

In the years following, the Opera House became a recreational center, dance hall and an Economic Opportunities Office. It was sold to the City and County of San Francisco and declared an historic landmark in 1972. In 1976, the San Francisco Arts Commission's Neighborhood Arts Program, with assistance from community efforts, opened the doors of this facility for programming artistic and cultural events for the Bayview-Hunter's Point community.

Today, the Bayview Opera House continues this function as a neighborhood cultural center, and the staff and advisory board are committed to maintaining and expanding its arts programs. We invite all members of the community to come and celebrate its history and the arts as we begin our second century!




