


Dear Friends,

What a summer!

A revitalized and renewed Excelsion Branch Library is now open for business. It looks amazing and it will be the first of many new

and improved branch libraries that will help reinvigorate our neighborhoods.

Many thanks to our Excelsior Branch Library Campaign Committee who did a wonderful job of energizing the Excelsior community and raising significant funds to provide their branch with new furniture and computers.

We are also pleased to announce that, starting in July, Friends will begin to disperse \$750,000 in new grants to the San Francisco Public Library to fund programs and services for the coming fiscal year. These dollars help fill the gap between what San Franciscans need from their libraries and what the city can provide and ensure that vital programs like Summer Reading, High School and Beyond and Project Read continue.

When combined with our Neighborhood Library Campaign support, Friends will provide the San Francisco Public Library with \$2.5 million in direct funding over the next twelve months. This critical support is made possible through the generosity of our members and donors.

And don't forget to pick up your copy of *China Boy* by Gus Lee, the One City One Book choice for 2005. It's the one book that everyone will be reading this fall. Excelsior Opens its Doors

We did it! From generous individual gifts to wonderful events to penny jars at neighborhood businesses; we left no stone unturned to help raise funds and aware-



ness of the Excelsior Branch Library renovation. It is now time to celebrate the historic opening of our first renovated branch library!

"We are beginning a great renaissance for the San Francisco public library system,"

said Donna Bero, Friends executive director. "The Excelsior branch is the first in what will be many renewed and improved libraries that will help revitalize our neighborhoods and benefit so many in our community."



Since its closure in November 2003, the Excelsior branch has received a complete makeover including improvements for seismic safety as well as Americans with Disabilities Act compliance. The children and teen sections have been relocated and expanded and there is a new,

flexible program room for after school homework, computer training, small group meetings or other programs.

Thanks to Friends and a generous outpouring of community support, the Excelsior branch's interior has also been completely revitalized with all new furniture and new computers with access to the internet and library online resources.

People Make it Happen



Voulunteer Extraordinaire Richard Colin

For fifty years Richard Colin has lived in the Excelsior and for most of those years he spent his time working hard at San Francisco General Hospital. Since his retirement four years ago though, Richard has been working hard for his neighborhood—especially the renewed and improved Excelsior Branch Library.

"I became involved because I wanted to help create something modern and new for the neighborhood," Richard said. "Every neighborhood needs a nice library. I'm really happy with how ours turned out."

Richard is a member of the Excelsior Branch Library Campaign Committee, a collection of fourteen dedicated individuals who have worked tirelessly on their own and as a team for the past two years to raise the private funds needed to pay for the new furniture, fixtures and equipment in the branch.

"I've met a wonderful group of people," Richard said. "Everyone has worked very hard to make this happen." Richard's hard work included—with help from his sister Delia—small things such as providing refreshments for almost all the committee meetings to generous acts like buying forty Excelsior calendars for his friends and neighbors.

"Richard rocks," said Marian Chatfield-Taylor, Friends' capital campaign manager and staff liaison to the committee. "He's quiet about his support for the library, but he's steady and generous with his time and contribution. It's the hard work of unassuming people like Richard that makes this campaign so special and so successful."

Ultimately, Richard says he will be happiest when he sees the results of his efforts first hand. "I used to see so many kids in the old library," he said. "It gives you a good feeling to help reopen a wonderful library that kids and seniors and all the people in the neighborhood will be able to use and enjoy."

A Great Place for Young People



The reopening of the Excelsior Branch has generated some serious buzz from an unlikely source. "I've had a lot of teens in the neighborhood ask me when the Library is going to open," said Dominic Scappaticci, the Excelsior teen librarian.

"They are very excited about the new branch. It will be a great place for them to hang out."

Two new features of the renovated Excelsior Branch are the new teen area and the relocated children's section. Both of these areas will be in high demand as the Excelsior neighborhood has one of the highest concentrations of teens and children in the City.

"The old library had a tiny corner for the teens to hang out in," noted Dominic. "We now have a much larger area with

teen books and magazines and plenty of computers near by." An Excelsior Teen Advisory council will help select the materials for the new space and Dominic anticipates plenty of activity in the Teen Area this summer including a new DJ program and book groups.

While teens will be at one end of the library, younger children have their own new space at the opposite end. "I'm probably most excited about the new children's area," said Terry Gwiazdowski, the Excelsior branch manager. "We moved it from the front of the library to the back, right next to our new program room. It can accommodate more kids and we'll be able to keep an eye on them."

Close proximity to the program room will make it easier for kids and parents to attend library programs like Lapsits and Storytimes and other special events at the branch. Terry concluded by saying: "It's really going to be a wonderful space for children."

Library Legislative Day 2005

One of Friends' many charges is to increase the amount of government funding directed toward the City's libraries. On April 20th, more than twenty Friends traveled to Sacramento to meet with State officials as part of Library Legislative Day, sponsored by the California Library Association. Friends met with Assemblymember Leland Yee and representatives from Mark Leno's office as well as representatives from State Senators Jackie Speier and Carole Migden's offices. We let them know about the great things happening in our neighborhoods and we thanked them for their successful support of our Proposition 14 applications last fall, which resulted in \$9.7 million in restoration funds for San Francisco's libraries.

OUT AT THE LIBRARY

Friends is pleased to be one of the many sponsors of Out at the Library: Celebrating the James C. Hormel Gay and Lesbian Center. The James C. Hormel Gay & Lesbian Center, considered to be the first archives of its kind in a public library, will celebrate its 10-year anniversary this summer with an extraordinary exhibition from the Center's collections of artifacts, documents and photographs spanning over 100 years. This exhibition will be on display from June 18 through October 16, 2005 at three sites: Main Library, Lower Level, Jewett Gallery; James C. Hormel Gay and Lesbian Center, 100 Larkin Street (at Grove) and Eureka Valley/Harvey Milk Memorial Branch Library, 3555 16th Street (near Market).

Out at the Library will include an accompanying 144page fully illustrated catalogue that will celebrate the Hormel Center by telling the story of how it came into existence, illustrating the Center's rich exhibition and program history and highlighting its collection. The catalogue can be purchased at either of Friends' two bookstores: Book Bay Main or Book Bay Fort Mason.

STORYTIME & LAPSITS

TEEN SUMMER READING 2005

Friends will again sponsor Teen Summer Reading 2005, which will be held at 25 different locations of the San Francisco Public Library, from June 11 through July 23. Teens will read for 10, 20 or 30 hours, and record their thoughts about what they read on comment cards. Prizes are awarded for each ten hours of reading and include gift certificates to Borders Books and Music, Ben & Jerry's ice cream coupons, free books, amusement park passes, free arts classes, and more! Plus all teens will have a chance to win grand raffle prizes at the end of the program. A special "teens only" finale party will be held on July 29th for those who read for 30 hours or more.

Private funds were needed to furnish and equip the branch as they were not paid for by the Branch Library Improvement Program, the 2000 bond measure that provides for the branch's structural renovation. Friends partnered with a group of neighborhood residents who formed the Excelsior Branch Library Campaign Committee to raise the needed funds.

"I'm proud of our partnership with Friends and the neighborhood," noted Terry Gwiazdowski, the Excelsior branch

manager. "And I really appreciate their efforts in spearheading the Excelsior campaign."

The community also played a key role in the development of the new branch by participating in a needs assessment analysis, taking a vocal and active role at several community design meetings, and helping to ensure appropriate interim services for the community while the branch was closed.


