Fire Engine Company 33 Again At Risk After Three Month Reprieve

Engine Company 33's station house, at Capitol and Sagamore Streets, is slated for closure during seismic retrofit. The Fire Department planned to mothball the truck and disperse the crew during the building's renovation, originally set to begin July 1, 2003 and last for a year or more. In June, District 11 residents lobbied for the Company's equipment and crew to be kept together. They asked they be housed at Engine Company 15's site at Ocean and Phelan during 33's retrofit. They won a temporary stay. The Mayor crafted a plan to keep the station open through September, and

bought time to locate funds to keep truck and crew in the district during the station's closure. By late September, funds had not been found. The Fire Department's management had not agreed to keep the truck and crew in the district. So reduced emergency and fire-fighting capacity in the area once again looms.

Supervisor Gerardo Sandoval and staff urge area residents to support Engine Company 33 with public comment at the Board of Supervisors' Finance and Audit Committee Meeting, October 22, 2003, at 12:30 p.m. in the John L. Taylor Committee Room, City Hall, Room 263. Effective support will

include suggestions for ways to fund the crew's continued presence in the area. Supporters unable to attend the October 22 hearing could be heard by sending a fax, letter or email to Aaron Peskin and Jake McGoldrick, who along with Sandoval, comprise the Finance Committee. Contact information:

In the earlier round of protest against the crew's dispersal and the engine's storage, residents pointed out that disbanding Company 33 is likely to create life-threatening delays in response time, by increasing service demands on two companies (Engine 15 at Ocean and Phelan, and Engine 43 at Moscow and France) already heavily utilized. Company 33's primary service areas are the Ocean View-Merced Heights and southern Crocker


In conjunction with the partnership, the partners announced the hiring of Cristy Johnston as the new ENCoRe manager.

Ingleside Branch Announces Two Public Meeting Dates

The Ingleside Branch Library rebuilding plan is moving ahead. The purchase of the Sunset Auto lot at 1298 Ocean Avenue, where the new structure will be built, is expected to close in October.

Tuesday, October 14

A public meeting on Tuesday, October 14 at 7 pm at the current branch location, 1649 Ocean at Faxon, will cover the future plans for the new building.

The new branch will be approximately 6,000 square feet. It will have defined children's and teen areas, a program room, will accommodate a growth in the collection of books, videos, DVDs and books on tape, and will include more public computers and provide a variety of seating choices.

Thursday, October 23

On Thursday, October 23 at 6:30 pm, a second meeting at the current location will cover the demolition plans for the Sunset Auto Shop and what will happen to the lot before the library is ready to build. Construction is scheduled to begin in 2005, with the new branch opening in 2007 or earlier.

The rebuilding of Ingleside Branch is part of a bond measure overwhelmingly passed by boters in November 2000.

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
