Poll campaign killings go on

MANILA — The election campaign death toll continues to climb with the killings of more candidates and their political leaders around the country the past week.

The latest victim of assassins' bullets in the escalating pre-election violence was lawyer Valeriano Layug, a candidate for mayor of Guagua, Pampanga, who was running under President Aquino's coalition PDP-Laban banner.

Layug, who was a former mayor of Guagua, was reported conducting a house-to-house campaign in barangay Natividad when he was shot at close range by three men armed with rifles and pistols last Dec. 15, at 5:10 p.m.

On the same day, political leader Ramon Marino was gunned down while campaigning in Sitio Bagumbong, Jala-Jala in Rizal province. Marino was campaigning for Vic Sumulong, Lakas secretary-general and candidate for governor of the province.

The two killings brought to 25

the number of persons killed in election-related violence since the official campaign period started last Dec. 1.

Layug was the second mayoral candidate in Pampanga killed during the current election
