




Merced Branch History and Quick Facts

- Merced Branch Library was built as part of San Francisco's branch library building boom of the 1950s, and it still reflects the style and values of that time.
- The building was designed by architects Appleton & Wolfard and built at a cost of \$137,511.
- Merced Branch opened on January 24, 1958. It was the 25th branch established in the San Francisco Public Library system.
- In March, 2006, Merced library users checked out 15,313 adult reading-level items, 1,680 Teen items, and 9,649 children's items, for a total circulation of 26,642 items.
- Merced's March, 2006, overall circulation total was the 7th highest among 22 open branch libraries. Merced's children's circulation ranked 6th highest among all branch libraries.
- In the library's most recent Satisfaction Survey, conducted in late November-early December 2005, 92% of Merced Branch respondents reported finding something they wanted in the course of their library visit.
- Branch users, in that same survey, reported that as for a language other than English, 38% preferred Chinese and 19% preferred Russian.
