Grand Opening of the Mission Bay Branch Library

This past summer, Mission Bay officially became a San Francisco neighborhood when the Mission Bay Branch Library opened its doors. On July 8, 2006 the branch became the 27th branch of the San Francisco Public Library and the first new branch in San Francisco in 40 years.

Mayor Gavin Newsom, City Librarian Luis Herrera, Friends Executive Director Donna Bero, former Mayor Willie L. Brown Jr., Supervisor Chris Daly and many other officials cut the ribbon celebrating the grand opening of the branch; the first public community gathering place for the burgeoning new Mission Bay

neighborhood.

The new community has spent the past two years raising funds and awareness for the branch. From author events to walking tours to baseball forums, the Mission Bay Branch Library Committee has done a tremendous job in promoting the new branch.

The crowd braved the foggy August weather and enjoyed great food, entertainment, and speeches from local dignitaries. Over 300 hundred people joined the celebration and indeed there was a lot to celebrate.

As neighbors in the Western Addition eagerly await the completion of the renovations of the branch, they will be able to enjoy an unprecedented level of interim services designed to minimize the impact of closing a much loved

Engraved Bricks a Smashing Success!

From the streets of Noe Valley to cocktail parties in the Marina, engraved brick sales have proven to be a fantastic fundraising tool for a number of neighborhood library campaigns. For a \$250 donation, people can have their names or names of family members engraved on a brick which will then be set in a prominent area in front of their branch library. So far, West Portal, Marina, Noe Valley, and Portola branch libraries will have engraved bricks. They make great gifts for family members and children are enthralled with seeing their names set in

stone outside their favorite neighborhood institution.

The West Portal Library Campaign sold a whopping 73 bricks in under 5 months. The Marina Library Campaign sold out of bricks after a story about the campaign and the engraved bricks was published in the Marina Times. "We had brick orders rolling in through fax, mail, and e-mail everyday," beamed Marian Chatfield-Taylor, who heads up the Neighborhood Library Campaign.

They far exceeded their \$100,000 goal and energized the neighborhood in anticipation of the opening.

Located at the corner of 4th and Berry Street on the channel, the new branch is approximately 8,000 square feet in size and occupies the ground floor with an entrance on 4th Street and a view of the channel on the south side. In addition to the library, the building also houses an adult day health program, senior housing units, nonprofit office space, retail

storefronts, and a large community meeting room.

The Mission Bay Branch's collection includes 34,000 books, CDs, DVDs and other materials. A children's area, furnished with colorful furniture and stocked with a diverse collection of new books, will cater to the growing number of families moving into the neighborhood. Materials in large print and a state-of-theart large print reader to assist







